



Euphorbia Rudolph

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

This new sport of *Euphorbia x martinii* was selected by renowned plantsman David Tristram. The spring blooms are the typical chartreuse green of the species, but the real show begins in autumn. As night temperatures start to drop, Rudolph begins to produce red flower bracts, and the red "noses" are fully developed in time to make a colorful show for the holiday season. Here in the Pacific Northwest, we generally see color beginning in October. *PlantHaven; hybridized by David Tristram.*

USES

Evergreen Rudolph looks great year-round planted in beds, borders and containers. The showy green flower clusters accent the dark foliage. It is perfect for fall and early winter deck or porch pots in colder climates, or in beds and borders in more temperate climates.

GARDENER TIPS

- Plant in full sun, in average, well-drained soil.
- Although *Euphorbias* are drought tolerant when established, provide water during prolonged dry periods.
- Fertilize sparingly.
- Remove spent blooms.
- Avoid contact with the milky sap which can be a skin irritant.
- Some loss of lower foliage is normal with the onset of cool weather as "noses" develop, so skirt the base with low-growing plants.
